Content Elaborations

Key Ideas and Details:

The focus of this topic is the understanding that readers use tools to analyze literary text and strengthen their comprehension and critical thinking skills. Readers should be able to cite several pieces of textual evidence in order to analyze text. Readers should analyze how literary elements work together and how characters respond to these elements.

Craft and Structure:

The focus of this topic is the understanding that the structure and language of literary text varies according to the needs of the story. Different genres of literature make use of different text structures. Students will use analytical skills as they clarify figurative and connotative meanings and analyze the impact of literary devices and techniques on poetry, stories and dramas.

Comprehension and Collaboration:

The focus of this topic is the understanding that effective listeners collaborate to establish procedures and collegial discussion and decision making for the purpose of examining issues, sharing information and building understandings.
